CARING FOR OURSELVES, WHILE CARING FOR OTHERS.

ABCD Head Start staff work passionately and care deeply for the children and families of our program. As an inter-connected community, we recognize that we cannot care for others without also caring for ourselves.

In August 2022 ABCD Head Start staff came together in-person for the first time since the onset of the pandemic to launch the 2022-2023 school year. The day was devoted to honoring staff who are retiring, recognizing staff for years of service, and acknowledging those who have acquired degrees and credentials, as well as celebrating a Head Start "Hero or Heroine" from each center. A variety of sessions were offered that allowed staff to participate and learn about physical and mental health and wellness. In February 2023, we came together again for a variety of workshops on self-care and a day of celebration.

Recognizing that the human service and early education field is a challenging but rewarding career, we continued our endeavor to recognize staff through increased compensation. In 2022-2023 we increased the entry level rate for 30 front-line job titles by an average of 9.6%. We utilized state funding awarded by the Department of Early Education and Care (EEC) to issue retention bonuses with amounts based on salary in October 2022.



In turn, staff provided services to children and families with great care, thought and intentionality. Success can be measured in a variety of ways, but high quality service provision is illustrated by our families themselves, who reported at the end of the school year that:

- They are more likely to engage in outdoor activities regularly;
- They feel more prepared for their child's transition to their next educational setting;
- They feel more connected to other parents and their community;
- Perhaps most importantly, they feel more prepared to advocate for their child's educational needs



WHO WE ARE

One of the core programs of President Lyndon Johnson's Economic Opportunity Act of 1964, Head Start remains an exemplary family development program that each year serves more than a million disadvantaged children nationwide. In 1965, ABCD (Action for Boston Community Development) was designated as one of the program's original demonstration projects.

Since then, ABCD Head Start & Children's Services has served tens of thousands of children and families in Boston and the Mystic Valley area, offering comprehensive education, health, dental, nutrition and related services for children from birth to age five, as well as for pregnant mothers. Parent participation is a cornerstone of the program. In addition, we strive to meet each child's needs while reflecting the community's ethnic and cultural values.

In the 2022-2023 program year ABCD Head Start centers, along with our partner programs (Boston Chinatown Neighborhood Center, Horizons for Homeless Children, Infants and Other People, John F. Kennedy Family Service Center and Nurtury) have a cumulative funded enrollment of 2,136. Together, we represent 30 centers, inclusive of 3 family child care programs, dedicated to providing services to pregnant women, children birth through age five, and their families:









FEATURED STORY: STAFF PROFILE

MELANIE SAHKTA

ABCD Head Start Mentor / Coach

As a little girl growing up in Boston, Melanie Sahkta, her sister, and cousins would play "school," and she was always the teacher. As she grew older, she realized that teaching was her calling.





She spent five years with an early education center where she transitioned from teacher to coach. In 2022, she joined ABCD Head Start & Children's Services as a mentor/coach, and she was immediately struck by ABCD's commitment to diversity and cultural sensitivity. She was thrilled to see the significant diversity of ABCD Head Start leaders and staff during a video call on her first day. She said, "This is where I want to work; this is where I want to be and grow." Management and staff mirror the children and families that ABCD Head Start serves, and incorporating racial and cultural richness into the curriculum - and even in meals and snacks – is a core aspect of the program.

As a mentor/coach, Melanie helps educators to develop their skills and grow in their practice. She finds inspiration and camaraderie in her colleagues, as well. She looks forward to continuing to collaborate with her co-workers, but when asked how she'd like her career to evolve, she said she could see herself as an education supervisor "because I love working with people and being their biggest cheerleader."



But her greatest satisfaction comes from the children, and for her, that means the infants, toddlers and preschoolers at the ABCD Head Start centers in East Boston, Everett, Malden, and Medford. "I was always a strong believer in building a child up from the start, and watching them grow is very impactful," she said.

ABCD Early Head Start Teacher ABCD Head Start & Children's Services, Jamaica Plain



Omolayo Musa has been an early childhood educator for 25 years. That means she now experiences the thrill of watching some of her former students heading off to college. "Some of the kids love me so much that I will follow them throughout their lives," she said, noting that "seeing their development from infancy to adulthood is incredible."

Omolayo joined ABCD Head Start & Children's Services seven years ago, and while she has taught preschoolers, she has devoted most of her career to infants and toddlers. To her, there's nothing more gratifying than seeing a child's excitement when they learn something new – shapes, colors, letters. "That is pure joy



right there," she said, adding "When I first saw that, I knew I wanted to do this forever."

Her day starts at 8:15 a.m. Parents drop off their children, and the little ones, ecstatic to see her, squeal with happiness and greet her like a family member. She washes their hands, monitors them while they play, helps them eat breakfast, changes their diapers, and brushes their teeth.

From there, the plan can vary. They might go out for a walk on a sunny day or engage in learning activities such as finger painting, which allows the children to explore the texture of paint in their hands, or music time, where the children learn body movements and songs.

Working with young children is humbling because you feel "like the foundation of everything they're going to learn throughout their lives," she said. It's important to her to be a positive role model, as well. "While they're with me, they're going to feel safe, have fun – and learn a lot!"

It's a rewarding job, but it's also stressful. To unwind, Omolayo spends time with her 11-yearold son. "Being with him helps me," she said, and much of the time is spent watching him play football, soccer, karate, and track. And he has access to a great coach, since Omolayo played all of those sports, as well.

She urges anyone who loves children – and has patience – to consider a career in early childhood education because "seeing them grow is amazing."
